

50 EDITIONS OF SWCN

The Journey To Dur 50th Edition by Janet Claringbold

We are proud to present the 50th edition of Studfield Wantirna **Community News**

Our paper was established through Orana Neighbourhood House as a community development project funded by a grant from Knox City Council. The paper originally focussed on the localities around the shopping strips of Studfield on Stud Road in Wantirna and Wantirna Mall on Mountain Highway.

The first edition was published in winter 2008 with a production run of 3000 copies. We published 4 editions per year in line with the change of seasons. Distribution was initially via collection points around the local area, with a move to house to house delivery by Edition 5. The format was a magazine style production with a glossy colour cover and black and white throughout. The first edition ran a story about local identity Wally Gaugg from Boocock's Butcher Shop at Studfield shopping centre which won an award at the Community Newspaper Association of Victoria (CNAV) Annual Awards for best community story.

In 2010 Studfield Wantirna Community News became independent from Orana and set up as an incorporated organisation. We ran a logo competition and received some excellent entries with the winning design provided by Lesley McGee was featured in 2011 on the cover of Edition 14 which launched the first edition in the new tabloid format featuring colour throughout. Our production run increased to 7000 copies.

In 2012 our most significant achievement was the move from quarterly to bi-monthly production which meant better continuity for our readers and advertisers and more options for news and content.

In 2013, through the generosity of Principal Sue Bell from Wantirna College, and with another grant from Knox City Council for some equipment, we established a new home base at Wantirna College. We launched a new-look format designed by local Graphic Design student, Tamara Bouzo. We increased our production run once again, expanding into Knoxfield and Scoresby with the aim of supporting the goal for Knox Community Newspapers reaching across all suburbs of Knox. By Edition 24 our production increased to 10,500 copies.

In our first edition of 2014 we proudly announced we met our production goal of 18,000 copies. We were successful at the CNAV conference awards with a runners-up award for best community content which was a great thrill and represented the "media industry" at the Mullum Cluster of schools Vocational Education and Training awards night.

By 2015 we had increased our production run to 19,000 copies, making Studfield Wantirna Community News the community newspaper with the highest circulation in Victoria. This is an exceptional achievement for a small volunteer committee.

We held our inaugural Writing Competition in partnership with the Eastern Regional Libraries with a monetary prize awarded to the winning writers. Sixty-seven entries were received from local primary and secondary schools. Wantirna Primary School exceeded expectations, contributing the most entries even though it is the smallest local school.

In 2016 we expanded into Bayswater and have recently increased production to 20,000 copies each edition. Our paper is available in Bayswater through drop-off points across the suburb. The paper is being taken up enthusiastically with each location needing additional copies on a regular basis. At the 2016 CNAV Annual Awards SWCN was awarded the winner of the category "Best Design and Layout" which was a great honour.

There are so many people we should thank as we reflect on our journey. Our volunteers, especially Coral and Charles Carew and Keith and Jenny Slater who form the backbone of our production team, Orana Neighbourhood House for it's initial support, Wantirna College for our home base. Knox City Council for funding through the Community Development Grants and our loyal and long-standing advertisers and contributors who have supported our paper since Edition 1 in 2008.

WHAT'S COOL AT SCHOOL?

KIDSC brings you the league of Extraordinary learners by Vanessa Bradbury



"On your mark, get set, Flow!" This year's First Lego League (FLL) season is overflowing with problems that need to be investigated This year's theme is everything to do with water, Hydro Dynamics. Students must become engineers and scientists as they have to choose and solve a real world problem relating to how the world finds, transports, uses or disposes of water. As part of this, students build, test and program autonomous robots using LEGO Mindstorms to solve a set of missions in the Robot Game.

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At Knox Innovation Opportunity and Sustainability Centre (KIOSC) we are training two incredible teams to compete in this year's First Lego League competition. FLL is an international set of yearly competitions co-sponsored by FIRST and LEGO that focuses on creative problem solving, STEM focused learning and developing team working skills. Groups of up to 10 young people from a wide variety of backgrounds form teams and compete in a regional robotics event. During their sessions teams and their coaches create innovative project-based solutions to hard-hitting

globally-focused problems. Instead of the traditional "top down" learning opportunities, where the teacher leads all activities, league members are tasked with discovering solutions to a wide-range of problems, with support of dedicated coaches. This is a great example of student- driven inquiry, the approach to learning which KIOSC promotes. At KIOSC we are committed to encouraging and developing our future engineers and scientists and FLL is a great opportunity to do this.

Our two innovative teams, consisting of students from Years 4 to 8, are meeting every Tuesday for 9 Weeks to research global water issues and prepare their robot to carry out a series of tasks on a game table

The regional competition will be held at Swinburne Wantirna on the 15th of November. Teams will present their projects to a panel of judges, and explain their solutions, describe how they have



learnt to work as a team to manage the project, and compete against other teams to find the most efficient robots. Congratulations to Studfield/Wantirna Community News on reaching the 50th edition.

Bayswater residents are delighted to have their articles included in this newspaper and we have many stories and history to share. Bayswater is a vibrant part of the City of Knox.

It is not through lack of trying that Bayswater is the only part of Knox that doesn't have its own monthly or quarterly newspaper.

The photo displaying Bayswater Inside Out, Bridge Across the Creek Newspaper and first printed in 1992, also celebrated their fiftieth edition in 1997. This popular little newspaper managed to reach one hundred editions before closing in 2001. The only reason for closing was lack of advertising to pay for the printing. At the time we had plenty of keen volunteers and deliverers but Bayswater did not have many shops to advertise. BIO, as this newspaper was affectionately known, covered Postcode 3153 and included Bayswater North.

We had a huge following of readers and our stories included profiles of our local shopkeepers and our popular segment, Lovable Local. At the time it was very hard to get a grant and the rising costs of printing up to 8,500 copies each month became too much. We tried to attract sponsors to no avail.

The story in the photo says two previous newspapers also struggled to survive. In 2010 a Newspaper known as Bayswater Buzz was launched. This newspaper also found it difficult to function without volunteers and only reached sixteen editions before closing in 2014.

We look forward to our continued involvement with Studfield/Wantirna Community News and know readers will find copies at the Bayswater Library, Bayswater Newsagent, Knox Op Shop, Senior Citizens and many other drop points.

Anzac Crete Veterens Honoured from Tony Tsourdalakis

In a full house at the Members Pavilion of the Cretan Village, the Pancretan Association of Melbourne & the Cretan Brotherhood of Melbourne under the auspices of the Battle of Crete & Greece Commemorative Council hosted an Honorary Luncheon in honour of our last four (4) surviving ANZAC Crete Veterans here in Victoria, namely 104 year old Lesley Manning who served in the 2nd/ 7th Australian Infantry Battalion, 97 year old Norman Maddock also from the 2nd /7th Australian Infantry Battalion, 98 year old Ian Barker who served in the 2/3rd Australian Light Anti-Aircraft Artillery and 96 year old Dave Humphreys who also served in the 2/3rd Australian Light Anti-Aircraft Artillery, who travelled from Bendigo to be part of the event.



The Veterans were given a standing ovation and were awarded a medal from the Deputy Chief of Staff of the Hellenic Defence Forces Lieutenant General Konstantinos Floros accompanied by Lieutenant Colonel Christos Anastasiadis for what they did on Cretan soil back in 1941.

The representatives of the Municipality of Malevizi from the Prefect of Iraklion, Crete, and in particular Mr. Giorgos Aerakis together with Mr. Kostas Trigonis also honoured the surviving Veterans with the City of Malevizi official medal as well as with a silver plated customary Cretan knife and finally the Chairman Mr. Larry Irwin and Executive Secretary Mr. Tony Tsourdalakis on behalf of the Battle of Crete & Greece Commemorative Council also awarded the four honoured guests with Certificates of Commendation and Appreciation for their service and bravery

All four Veterans clearly emotional in their eyes spoke highly of the sacrifices of the Cretan people to house them, feed them and shelter them from the German Occupation whilst trying to escape from the island of Crete and in many

circumstances putting their own lives at risk to ensure that the ANZAC allied soldiers returned home to Australia.

Diabetes

Hello lovely readers!

This month at Community Pharmacy Wantirna we are focusing on diabetes.

Diabetes Australia estimate that 2 million Australians are at high risk of developing Type 2 Diabetes and that 500,000 Australians have undiagnosed Type 2 Diabetes which may be damaging their bodies while left untreated. Undiagnosed diabetes (and poorly controlled diabetes) can lead to severe health complications including: blindness, kidney disease, heart disease, and limb amputation.

Diabetes is something very close to my heart as at the age of 21, I was diagnosed with a specific form of Type 1 diabetes known as latent onset in adults. This is the same form of diabetes that usually affects children, but occurs instead later on in life as an adult. The onset of this form of diabetes can be quite slow and so for months prior to my diagnosis I was experiencing symptoms such as: Extreme thirst, weight loss, increased fatigue, constant infections, dry skin, and wounds not healing, I felt irritated a lot of the time!

I actually diagnosed myself as I learnt about diabetes at Uni and when the lecturer put the slide of symptoms on the screen I ticked off nearly all of them! When I saw my doctor she checked my blood sugar levels and I was 32 mmol/L! This is 4 times the normal range! No wonder I was feeling so unlike myself.

I now manage my diabetes with 4 insulin injections a day and believe me, being a busy pharmacist some days it can be hard to manage things appropriately, but I try my best

I encourage anyone who thinks they may be at risk of diabetes to get yourselves checked out! Hearing 'diabetes' can be a scary thing, but it can be managed and I know from personal experience that making a few changes to your daily routine can give you your quality of life back and that's something that's worth making the change for.

Those who are at most at risk are the following groups:

- Aged 40 years and over
- Physically inactive
- Have a family history of diabetes
- · People who are overweight
- Smokers

To do our part to help, we are running screening assessments for anyone who wants to check their diabetes risk. See below for more details.

For those of you out there who may already be diagnosed with diabetes I am also running a foot assessment in store and a check of all your diabetes related questions.

During this appointment we will:

- Screen your feet for any signs of diabetic neuropathy
- Asses your overall foot health
- Do a check of all your medications
- Address any concerns you have in regards to diabetes
- Create an action plan to lower your blood glucose levels
- Clean and check your blood glucose testing meter

As I have said I am very passionate about this disease and can let you know during our appointment what has personally worked and not worked for me.

Deadly Bloodsuckers In Dur Midst By Dr. Gloria Dieu from Wantirna Vet Clinic

With Spring being peak paralysis tick season in Australia, we should be mindful that nationally, the tick distribution has expanded by 17% in the last 10 years and their numbers have also increased in 73% of locations surveyed. The biggest concern is that we can now no longer consider Melbourne a tick free zone. Over recent years, Australian paralysis ticks (Ixodes Holocyclus) have been travelling to central Melbourne by either hitching a ride on pets from tick endemic areas or via tents and camping gear that have ventured out along the eastern coastline of Australia. Paralysis tick cases have been reported in a number of inner suburbs, including St Kilda, Brighton, Canterbury, Surrey Hills, Prahran, Eltham and Donvale...all of which are not too far from Wantirna!

Whilst most ticks on dogs are found around the head, neck and shoulders, they can be found anywhere on the dog's surface. Once attached, the female paralysis tick draws a blood meal and gradually engorges, while simultaneously injecting neurotoxins into their host that cause paralysis in their muscles. Common symptoms observed in tick paralysis include the following: vomiting, appetite loss, gagging, drooling, altered bark/ meow, lethargy, laboured breathing/ panting, coughing and progressive limb weakness which is first seen in the hindlimbs. Ultimately the paralysis becomes so severe that the animal is unable to stand or even lift its head. If you suspect that your pet has a tick, please seek immediate veterinary care. Left untreated, the outcome is often fatal.

The primary treatment for tick paralysis involves the careful administration of anti-tick serum which needs to be administered early before the signs are advanced for the best chance of a full recovery. Removal of the tick as soon as possible is vital as well. Prevention is MUCH better than cure, so don't risk it. Prevention can be achieved by a combination of daily searching for ticks in tick- prone regions and the use of tick preventatives. Our current bestseller is Bravecto, which treats and controls ticks for a period of 4 months! The two features which are most easily recognised and which are characteristic of lxodes holocyclus are demonstrated by the following pictures.



1. The anal groove forms a complete, though somewhat pear-shaped oval around the anus



2. The first and last pairs of legs are distinctly darker than the middle two pairs of legs

Renewal at St Lukes's Church



History of Dandenong Creek


Dandenong Creek in the 1940s was all a child could desire – somewhere to swim all through summer; crystal clear water to quench one's thirst; blackberries (and mushrooms nearby) to pick in the season; frog spawn to be taken to school; wattle and Little Sedge to be picked to delight Mother; titree saplings to be cut for Xmas trees or a stave for Scouts; picnics with the city cousins; wrens; robins; eels to be caught with a worm on the hook and a cork float on the line; maiden hair swathes; and annual winter floods for rafting and paddling.

By the mid-fifties all had changed. No longer idyllic as houses and industry started to encroach outwards from Bayswater. Soon the waterway was not fit for swimming, Noxious Weed inspectors waged war on the blackberries and the Dandenong Valley Authority had been established to institute flood mitigation works.

Membes of the Heathmont History Group have prepared an 88 page report "The European History of Dandenong Creek from Bayswater Road to Boronia Road. Page 19 spells it out –

"The broad flat nature of the Creek's catchment has made it always susceptible to flooding. Particularly once suburban spread had reached to and beyond Bayswater, the swamps and flooding could no longer be tolerated".

The meandering creek had to be tamed.




"Boronia Road bridge (khs image 1631)"

Dandenong Creek begins its 53km journey to the swamps adjoining Port Phillip Bay on the slopes of Mt Corhanwarrabul within the 689 acre Doongalla Estate fed by small tributaries, some still unnamed.

The First People followed its Song Line to the mountain to escape summer heat, gathering mussels, trapping eels in the stream and possums in the ti-trees as they journeyed.

European exploitation of the creek started in 1837 when cattle were grazed on the flats by overlanders and a depot for the Native Police was established. Settlement quickly followed – Thomas Napier acquired land, now Jells Park, in 1838, Rev. Clow built Tirhatuan in 1841. Timber cutters soon followed harvesting River Red Gums on the flats and tall timbers on the slopes. Farmers occupied the plain, soon to supply produce to the Dandenong Market, the Butter Factory and later the Bacon Factory. Bosisto established a eucalyptus still in 1852 and botanists Daniel Bunce (1834) and Von

Mueller (1853) extolled the unspoiled beauty of the headwaters.

Flooding was always a concern. In 1879 the Minister for Works authorized the cutting of a channel from the Carrum Swamp to the Bay, creating the "Patterson River". Eighty five years later retarding basins, pipes, concrete channels and straightening would control flooding with the additional allure of increased farming, residential and recreational use.

"Admittedly the creek was now little more than an open sewer".


The rapid spread of factories, offices and homes and the proposal of a freeway towards Healesville added to the problems facing planners. Drastic problems gave rise to drastic remedies. When completed the Dandenong Valley Authority then joined with Melbourne Water and Municipal Councils to enhance management of the waterway, but no reclamation will ever return the creek to its former glories.

Knox Historical Society's 'History & Mystery' Cemetery Tours



No Drdinary Life - Positive Ageing in Knox Dementia is not a dirty word.

Often associated with the ageing process is the degenerative disease of the brain, most commonly known as dementia. Whilst it is true that dementia "is the single largest cause of disability in people over 65" it is a furphy that it is a normal part of the ageing process. In fact, dementia can and does affect adults of all ages.

A recent report commissioned by Alzheimer's Australia reported Knox is home to 2,626 people diagnosed with dementia, up 4.9% on the prior year. The report also forecast that Knox would see significant growth of those affected by Dementia over the next 30 years, projected to increase by 384% to an estimated 12,711 Knox residents with the disease.

September was Alzheimer's Awareness month and as Alzheimer's is the most common form of dementia, I wanted to take the opportunity to write about this important topic under the heading of positive ageing. In recent months I have had the pleasure of spending time with dementia sufferers and their loved ones. I have been given a raw unedited insight into their lives and particularly the physical and emotional strain often placed on the husband / wife carer. I have sat with carers who are physically and emotionally broken and yet selflessly give every speck of energy they have to caring for their spouse.

What I have learnt is that caring for an adult with dementia is harder than caring for a newborn or infant. It is more draining and socially isolating and unlike raising an infant, there is no reward for effort other than knowing that you are doing your best.

My article this month is therefore a shout out for all the carers out there - those that put their own needs last to care for their loved ones. What is apparent is that there needs to be better support services in place to provide affordable respite so that carers can catch their breath. Their also needs to be greater compassion and understanding of both the dementia afflicted and their carers right across our community. It broke my heart to hear stories where family and friends had "abandoned" couples because dealing with the dementia was too hard, too boring or inconvenient. In the words of one carer, "I soon found out who my true friends are, the ones who have stuck by me, reached out to me and are there for me on the days that are just too hard."

I personally would like to see Knox be more dementia friendly. With simple interventions, we could make our public spaces more accessible for people with dementia and their carers. This would include consideration to providing safe environments and meaningful opportunities for people with dementia to still participate as valued and included members of our community.



Fungal foot infections

There are different types of fungal infections of the skin and nails that occur on feet and can be itchy, contagious and hard to clear. Fungal infections thrive in dark, moist, hot environments, these conditions make feet prone to fungal infections.

Fungal nail infections cause nails to become thick, discolour, have an odour and break easily. However, some nails may look fungal but are not as their appearance may have been caused by different mechanisms such as trauma or a systemic disease such as Psoriasis. If you are worried about your nails a Podiatrist can help diagnose the cause, recommend an appropriate course of treatment including anti-fungal treatments and professionally trim and thin the nail. Keeping fungal nails trim and thin can help facilitate anti-fungal treatments.

Fungal infections of the skin can occur on feet between the toes known as athletes' foot or tinea pedis. Fungal infections of the skin can be apparent in three general forms: vesicular type tinea pedis where there are small vesicles on the feet with fluid inside, hyperkeratotic type tinea pedis where the tinea causes thickening and dryness of the skin



and interdigital type tinea pedis where the skin becomes white and flaky with fissures between the toes. These infections also require an anti-fungal preparation for their cure and effort to ensure that you don't reinfect yourself. However, there are some skin conditions that resemble tinea pedis but are treated differently so a proper diagnosis and treatment regime is required.

Council encourages pedal power during October

Knox Council is encouraging residents to explore the health benefits of switching from four wheels to two next month.

This comes as more than 150,000 Australians are expected to ride their bikes to work as part of Ride2Work Day on Wednesday, 18 October.

Knox Council Deputy Mayor, Cr John Mortimore, said "Cycling is a great way of getting more physically active and de-stressing, while also helping to save money on petrol and parking."

"Council is supporting the growth of cycling across Knox by investing in cycling-related safety and infrastructure projects." These include:

Marie Wallace Oval Bike Repair Station – the first one in Knox, this facility will be a free-standing station which will allow bike users to pump a tyre, fix punctures etc;

George Street Bike Link Safety Trail – Installation of measures to improve driver awareness and visibility of cyclists on the road when turning in and out of an intersection. Also, improving on-road facilities to encourage cyclists to cycle on the road rather than on the footpath;

Bike It Challenge – Knox Council will run this competition, along with Casey Council, for the first time on Thursday, 2 November at Stud Park Reserve. "Bike It" is an interschool bike skills event where Grade 5 and 6 students compete against each other to highlight cycling skills they have learnt through bike ed; and

Jazz Historian Jack Mitchell helps Museum by Ken Simpson-Bull

The Australian Jazz Museum is fortunate to have the assistance of Australia's foremost jazz historian and discographer, Jack Mitchell. Jack is the author of several books on Australian jazz performers and jazz history. His discography, "Australian Jazz on Record", contains comprehensive details of the personnel and other details of almost every commercial jazz recording made in this country from 1925 to the present, the current edition being available on a CD ROM of more than 1,100 pages. Staff at the Museum know that to ask Jack a question about jazz is to receive an accurate and comprehensive answer.

Jack, a young 91 years old, lives in Lithgow, NSW, and is a retired dentist who has been a jazz aficionado since his teens. Apart from an occasional article for the Museum's magazine, he recently helped the Jazz Museum produce a double-CD



called "Jazz Masters of the 1940s" using much material from his collection of rare jazz recordings. His latest assistance is to provide and recommend more rare material to assist in the production of the Museum's latest double-CD, "More Jazz Masters of the 1950s" (AJM 039). This new CD set, containing a generous 2½ hours of entertaining music, much of it never-before-released, may be purchased from the Museum shop or on-line at www.ajm.org.au.

K.E.S's plants of the month are Lomandra Longafolia and all eucalypts for only \$1.00 per tube!

Eucalypts are a dominant part of the Australian flora. Commonly known as gum trees, eucalypts have evolved to be an integral part of the Australian identity with the bush. From the children's song Kookaburra sits in the old gum tree through to the distinctive smell of eucalypts to iconic paintings and photographs, eucalypts are an essential part of Australian culture, featuring in art, music and literature. Eucalypts come in a great range of shapes and sizes – from tall trees to small shrubs and the Nursery has several species to choose from. Eucalypts serve as shelter for many species of native Australian animals and birds. Did you know that it is only a few varieties of gum leaves that are the primary and only food source eaten by koalas!

Planting eucalyptus is important and it is of significance to the survival of native flora and fauna, but consideration needs to be made as to where it will be planted given that we live in an ever growing suburban sprawl with its necessary infrastructure.

Free advice on planting eucalypts is available at the nursery as well as information on the possible location to plant grasses, shrubs and herbs such as Lomandra Longafolia, which not only has a lovely native flower but a food source that attracts our local native birds.

Say "hello" to Knox Woodies by Harry Deschepper

For almost thirty years the Knox and District Woodworkers' Club has been the Ferntree Gully region's focal point for men and women who have a common interest in any aspect of woodwork

The club, formerly known as the Ferntree Gully Woodworkers' Club, was set up in 1988 under the guidance of first president, Alf Stephens. In that first year meetings were held in makeshift premises at the local tech school. Following lobbying by club members, the local Knox City Council made one bay of a storage facility available as a permanent workshop. Over the following years members built two additional workshops and a modern clubroom on the site. While all machinery use is limited to the workshops, the clubroom houses a dozen workbenches where members can hone their handtool skills. The workshops have 2 table saws, 4 band saws, a jointer and a thicknesser, 2 router tables, pedestal drills, nine lathes in the turning room, and much more and all machines are connected to a state of the art dust extraction system ensuring that dust from woodworking activities is kept to an absolute minimum

Membership continues to grow and peaked at 206 last year. Age varies with 75% of members aged 45 to 85. We are a very inclusive group and age, gender, occupation or football team preferences are no barrier to membership. Currently we have about 30 female members, most of whom are very active.

Primarily the club exists to offer a comfortable place and good equipment to practice our woodcraft. The club is open daily except Sunday, and most weekday evenings. Each session has an emphasis on a particular interest group but members can work on any project at any time. The social aspect of the club is also very important and we have regular family functions.

In August the club holds its "Be In It" weekend, an event that gives all members a chance to showcase the projects they have worked on in the previous 12 months, and generally we have up to a couple of hundred entries. Wood turning always attracts large entry numbers and other popular categories include chopping and cheese boards, small furniture, rustic and recycled items and small boxes. Last year's winner was a carved traditional rocking horse.

Each year the club participates in two weekend festivals organised by the Knox City Council. These events allow the club to showcase itself to the general public, and give young children the chance to have a hands-on experience assembling a small wooden toy kit. It is pleasing when you see older children who made their kits in previous years bringing their younger siblings for their chance to sand, glue, nail or screw together a helicopter, or toolbox, a dolls cradle or perhaps a wooden teddy bear or robot.

Sri Lankan Seniors Connect by Cassie Honzak

Villa Maria Catholic Homes' (VMCH) innovative Multicultural Wellness Centre (MWC) in Wantirna South has expanded its reach to help connect more socially isolated seniors.

The centre has gone from strength to strength since opening 17 months ago; building its Chinese and Filipino social groups to 80 and 16 members respectively and recently forming a Sri Lankan group for people aged over 65 of Sri Lankan/ Sinhalese-speaking background.

"Being socially isolated can reduce life expectancy and overall health, both physically and emotionally," said VMCH Day Centre Coordinator Lynne Cahir.

"While there are many groups for people of Italian and Greek backgrounds, we found there was not much support for the Sri Lankan community. Language can also be a barrier. Most of the members do speak English but it still may be a bit of a challenge so we always have a staff member who speaks Sinhalese and we encourage members to chat in their native language.'

Members meet weekly to socialise, undertake cooking classes, exercise classes, go on community outings and listen to guest speakers.

Corrine Kelaart, 66, migrated to Australia in 1994. Since 2003, she has experienced racial discrimination and depression. She lives alone and struggles with missing her two children and grandchildren in Sri Lanka.

"Everybody (in the group) is so nice and they make me feel very welcome," Corrine said. "Every Monday I get up extra early, I don't even need to set an alarm, and get ready to come. I would be very lonely if I missed this."

Corrine encouraged more CALD seniors to come along.

"There might be a lot of people like me out there facing a lot of problems who don't have a place to go to. It's been a help for me."

Fellow group member Rita Padmaperuma, who also receives a Home Care Package from VMCH, described it as a "nice community".

"We have a chit chat and a cup of tea, do some chair exercises, have lunch and play some games. I like listening to other people's problems and helping if I can.'



Toys for Christmas

A strong focus of the club is to produce a large number of toys which can be distributed to the less fortunate members of our community at Christmas. In 2016 the club donated over 600 toys to various aid agencies in the district. This year, we intend to make more gifts aimed at adults. Pop's Shed in Croydon recently donated 50 pen kits, and our members are now busily turning wood blanks to complete these gifts.

Just last February, the club hosted Swiss professional wood turner Matthias Bachofen Beer who demonstrated his skills and talked about his career and craft. In Australia for a short visit, we were honoured that he gave us an evening of his time. We used this opportunity to set up a very successful in-house live feed to our Facebook page, so that members could view the event from their lounge room if unable to attend. (We even had a positive response from a member holidaying in his caravan on the NSW coast.) This was a first for the club and follows the recent addition of a club website.


Practice matches have been organized for both Saturday and Mid-Week teams where there will be an opportunity to put the new drills into practice.
