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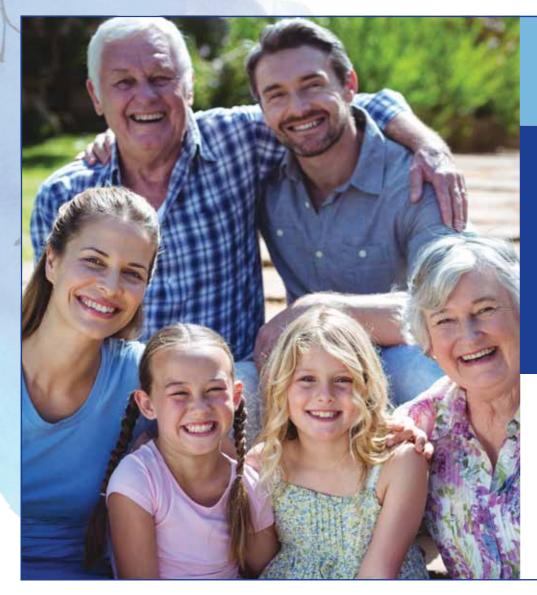


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Editorial

Its great to be a part of a community that cares and shares. I hope you enjoy what is shared in our Community Newspaper.

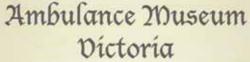

Back in 1986 a decision was made by a group of retired Ambulance officers to preserve the history of Victoria's ambulances and so the Ambulance Historic Society was formed.

Consequently the search began for suitable vintage ambulances, equipment and memorabilia, often beyond the bounds of Victoria.

In 2006 premises were obtained in Thomastown, and, as the Museum grew, it became necessary to re locate. A suitable factory was found at Factory 1/55 Barry Street, Bayswater.

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The museum is open for individuals, groups or club visits by appointment. Personal guided tours are conducted from Monday to Wednesday between the hours of 9.00 am to 1.00 pm.

Vehicles, memorabilia and retired personnel are available for public and corporate events and displays of over 3.000 items can be viewed.

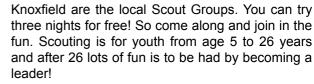

On May 29th 2018 I departed at 12:05am on a Singapore Airlines flight to Singapore as a stopover on my way to Beijing. The trip I was about to embark on was called the International Scholar Laureate Program which was created by a company called Envision who are based in Virginia in the United States.

This program was created by the company in the hopes of educating, motivating, and inspiring accomplished students to realise the power of their potential in their lives and careers. This meant I would be meeting students who had just finished graduating and did very well in their studies or

students that were still completing their degrees but were doing very well.

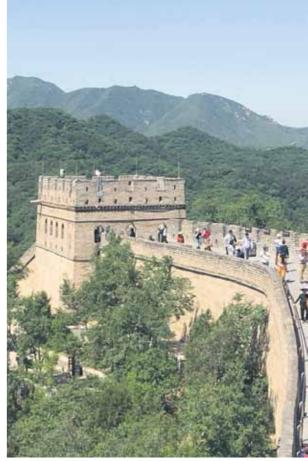

In this case I was with the Delegation of International Relations and Diplomacy which had the biggest number of students which was around 87.

I decided to join this delegation as I had been studying International Relations and the practice of diplomacy throughout my Bachelor's degree and now into my Master's degree which I am currently undertaking.

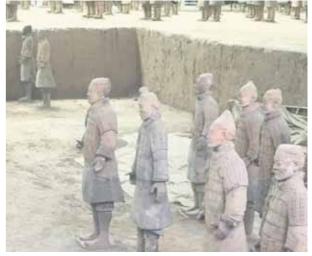
This program saw me explore the cities of Beijing, Xi'an and Shanghai in around 11 days and I must say I was never disappointed in what I saw and explored. For instance, in Beijing I got to hike the Great Wall of China which was great but I must admit the weather was hot as it was sitting around 32 degrees at the time I began my hike. In Xi'an I got to visit the world-renowned Terra Cotta Warriors which was a sight to behold and is a place that should be visited at least once in everyone's life as pictures of them on the internet just does not cut it.

I also explored the city of Shanghai which saw me visit sites such as Yu Garden, The Bund and Nanjing Road which was also remarkable. Lastly something important to point out about my trip is that from Beijing to Xi'an I took the world renowned bullet train that went up to around 300 km/hr which is not that fast compared to other bullet trains but was an exciting experience nonetheless.

In the end the trip was truly life changing and allowed me to explore a country that was very different to what I was used to here in Australia and in other countries I have been to around the world.

These can include:

- 1cup berries
- piece of medium fruit.
- 5 thin rice cakes.
- Small pita with 10gm peanut butter.
- Half a cup of reduced fat cottage cheese.
- Make vegetables interesting.
- Use a julienne peeler on zucchini. Make cauliflower rice.
- Stir fry vegetables. Use spices and reduced salt soy sauce. Make vegetable bake using tin tomatoes.
- Explore vegetables and spices you may never have used.

Coffier Ward News with Cr. Jackson Taylor



On the 25th June, Council adopted the 18-19 budget which has of course a big impact on our local community. This is my second budget and one in which I was proud to help deliver. It stands by my commitment to make Knox a safer place, further invests in mental health, and assists people from all life stages.

This budget sees:

- Rate increase capped at 2.25%
- \$100 for eligible pensioners rate rebate
- · Record investments in community infrastructure of over \$95 million and over \$11 million towards open space improvements
- · Continued operational surplus

In Collier Ward across Wantirna / W South there is also significant community investment:

Upgrades to Flamingo, Mariemont and Billoo Park Preschools

- \$400k for Stage 2 of the Master plan at Templeton Reserve
- \$182k for a shared pathway on Mountain Hwy under the East link underpass
- \$170k for on-road bicycle friendly upgrades on Templeton St, Renou Road, Coleman Parade and Timothy Drive.
- Development of a web based Youth App on our website
- \$46k to upgrade lighting along our shared pathways underpasses (Timothy Dr, Mountain Hwy)
- \$30k for an upgrade to the cricket nets at Wantirna Reserve
- \$450k in upgrades to Wantirna and Templeton **Tennis Clubs**
- \$245k to resurface Cherrington Square
- \$40k for a new footpath connection at Ashley Street/ Wantirna Road up to Boronia Road

One thing to keep in mind is that this year is a revaluation year and rates may increase above the rate cap representative of the relative movement in property capital improved value across the city. Across Collier Ward prices have increased significantly in value since the last valuation. If you have any queries related to your notices when they arrive please get in touch with us on 9298 8000.

Dental Care For Your Pets By Dr Martina Saeid BVSC

Dental care for our pets is very important! Almost 70% of dogs and cats over 3 years of age have some sort of dental disease. Dental disease causes bad breath (halitosis) and can be quite painful. It is also a source of infection which can make your pet unwell.

Dental disease is preventable in the majority of cases and is generally easy to achieve at home. There are many different methods to keep your pet's teeth clean and healthy and these should be started while they are puppies and kittens.

For adult cats and dogs with existing dental disease, a dental scale and polish under general anaesthetic is necessary to get their mouth back into top condition. This will allow us to start prevention with a clean mouth which needs to be continued at home to hopefully prevent, or slow down dental disease developing again in the future.

Tips to maintain oral hygiene:

- 1. Start early when they are puppies/ kittens.
- 2. Choose appropriate food, dry food is better than soft food.
- 3. Chew bones and toys regularly.
- 4. Brush their teeth.

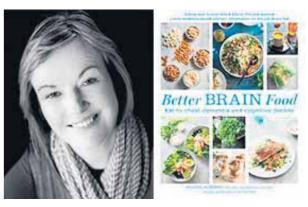

A Bird in the Bush by John E. Ford

The universal mantra held by Knox U3A, that you are never too old to do the things you like, is never more evident than in its Birdwatching group. I joined them for their weekly excursion on the morning of 25th May at the picturesque Heritage Golf & Country Club in Chirnside Park.

Capably led by John Bosworth, the group has about twenty-four members enrolled, but on this day twelve had turned up. On a glorious morning we made our way down the well-formed paths of the Country Club, between well-manicured lawns and gardens towards the Yarra River. Our "birders" were able to start listing species even in that built up environment.

A small herd of Eastern Grey Kangaroos watched as we approached the denser scrub bordering the river, and the bird-life, although now harder to see, increased. Water hens were seen foraging on the golf fairways in the distance, and honeyeaters, wrens and lorikeets were among the observations. Everything is noted; even the ubiquitous cockatoos and Indian Mynahs.

> The group has a different location each week for their activities, and whereas they no longer pound their way through impenetrable scrub, there are often challenging locations visited. Some of the members are comparatively recent to the hobby, while others have held a life-long interest in the wonderful bird-life that this Country offers. I spoke at length with Barbara Garrett who has been a longserving member of the group. Barbara, these days, has a few mobility issues, but still attends the excursions, pacing herself and not undertaking anything too outrageous, and is thus able

News from Tirhatuan Ward with Nicole Seymour No Ordinary Life – Positive Ageing in Knox Ever forgotten where you parked the car?

When it comes to writing this article each month I typically draw inspiration from things I see and hear in our local community. This month I want to share with you an experience I had when shopping at Eastland in the first week of the school holidays. Having arrived and found a park, I was sitting in my car when I noticed this dear elderly gent wandering up and down the lanes clearly looking for his car. I was on the phone, but I watched as at least 10 different people walked passed him without even acknowledging his clear distress. I ended my call, got out of my car and approached him. Sure enough he couldn't remember where he had parked and was getting quite flustered. What to do? This is where the carparking technology in shopping centres such as Eastland is fantastic. Those cameras above each car space that read your number-plate so they know how much car parking fees you need to pay also register exactly where your car is parked. I called Centre Management, was put through to the Car Park Management team. Gave them the gents registration (fortunately labelled on his keys). They then sent one of their team in a golf buggy to where the gent and I were standing, picked him up and shuttled him to his car. Well done Eastland Management!

However, this got me thinking on a whole range of things – firstly disappointment that so many people walked by without showing any empathy or kindness for a senior in distress. The second thing that suddenly dawned on me was about car park design in large public places like this. They are dark, often busy,

whilst there are alpha numerical identifiers on posts in each section they do all blend from one row to the next. Remembering where you parked can be challenging even for the most able minded. However, the design of carparks isn't particularly user friendly for Seniors who may have issues with short term memory as in the case of this man. Yes, there are disability car spaces, however people with short term memory problems may not have permits to park in these spaces. Anyway, it got me thinking. In the large shopping centres such as Knox and Eastland where there are "Parents with Prams" parking areas with clear sign posting, is there a need for something similar for seniors or should the parking areas just be better signposted using clear colour differentiation? It also got me thinking about whether there is a solution with technology. Can the car parking payment machines be used as a "find my car" resource for those that can't remember where they parked? I welcome community feedback on this. If you have had similar carpark experiences or have ideas on how seniors can be better supported with car parking at major shopping centres, please share with me. 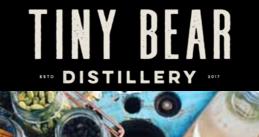

Speakers

June Speaker - Jackson Airey "Bottoms Up - Snorkelling around Melbourne"

This month he gave a wonderful presentation on his personal experiences of snorkelling in the bays around Melbourne. Although he has only been snorkelling for three years, he had many photos of the fascinating life, sometimes in less than a metre under the water. A good food source for native birds is not from the supermarket, local pet shop or kitchen scraps!

Providing natural food sources in your garden is an ideal way to attract birds without needing to constantly refill feeders or purchase seed.

While birds will happily eat commercial food and scraps, it is important to remember that they have less nutritional value than wild bird foods and should only be offered as occasional treats rather than a regular food source.

When looking to plant indigenous plants to attract birds in your garden to provide shelter, nesting and food, consider the 3 types of food source categories our native birds need.

Excursions

June excursion - Murrindindi. Leaders Eva and David Despite a threatening weather forecast, eight intrepid field naturalists arrived at the 'Suspension Bridge' camp ground in the Murrindindi Scenic Reserve. During the morning the weather cleared and we were able to investigate some of the nearby bushland. As expected we found quite a number of fungi but had a relatively low bird count. After visiting the Water Gauge camping are, we stopped briefly for a view of the Wilhelmina Falls which were flowing impressively.

It was interesting to note how the vegetation had recovered since the 2009 fires. On a short walk near the bridge we spotted more different fungi and had a great view of a male golden whistler.

July excursion - Yea Wetlands and Tunnel Hill/Cheviot Railway Tunnel, Limestone

Members met at the John Cummins Reserve. As we walked we could see the Swamp Gums and the Grand old River Red Gums which are homes for not only birds, but native animals as well. After lunch we headed to the nearby Cheviot Railway tunnel which was opened in 1889 and was used till 1970.

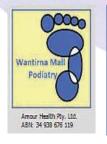

The foot is a complex structure of 26 bones and 35 joints held together with many ligaments and muscles. Children begin to walk between 8 to 18 months and are usually flat-footed with inwards turning in feet. As bones and muscles strengthen and develop the posture of the foot and lower limb advances until the shape of the adult foot is reached at the age of 6 years old.

The easiest thing you can do to keep your children's feet healthy at school is having appropriate footwear fitted. When choosing shoes look at the elements of the shoe. The shoe should only bend at the sole where the foot bends, at the forefoot, they should not be too flexible. The shoe should have a firm heel counter and wide enough for the forefoot. The length is also important, a thumbs' width of space at the end of the longest toe when standing allows for enough room for toes. Shoes should also have laces or a strap to hold the foot in place and stop clawing of the toes. It's important to match the shoes for the activity they are to be used for, the period of time, the required support and the ground surfaces.

Common walking issues should be assessed by a podiatrist if they cause pain in the feet, tripping or limping. Excessive in-toeing can be caused by several different issues such as hip joint problems. If the in-toeing is severe, seems to involve the leg and hip as well as the foot, or isn't improving by 1.5 to 2 years of age, see a podiatrist for an assessment. Occasionally some children walk with outward turned feet. In most cases this can self-resolve but see your podiatrist if you are concerned.

News from Wantirna Dsteopathy by Dr. Jason Stone

Heel/Arch Pain – Plantar Fasciitis

Painful feet are very debilitating. Pain in the heel area is especially common and may be associated with a calcaneal spur, usually referred to as a heel spur.

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Our feet are made up of a series of small bones known as the tarsal bones. These tarsal bones form an arch which is supported by a strong band of sinew (plantar fascia) stretching across the sole of the foot below the surface of the skin.

In cases where the arch is poorly supported or the muscles of the feet are overworked this fascia causes persistent traction (tugging) at the attachment point onto the bone. This often results in inflammation and pain developing at this site. This painful condition is known as Plantar Fasciitis.

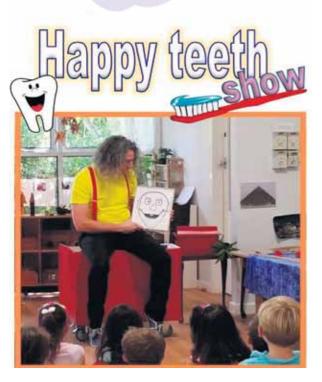
Sometimes a sharp 'spur' develops at the site of

this traction on the bone and protrudes into the surrounding tissue. This is the body's reaction to chronic inflammation and whilst it looks painful on Xray the pain is usually due to the plantar fasciitis rather than the heel spur itself. The inflammation created often spreads into the base of the heel and as a result the heel pad becomes very tender to walk on, particularly first thing in the morning.

Under supportive, unstable or sloppy footwear are the most common causes of plantar fasciitis. As the arch is collapsing the plantar fascia is placed under great stress and often other muscles of the foot and lower leg are utilised to help with stability resulting in the likelihood of arch pain.

Osteopaths will not only advise you on appropriate footwear and exercises but will work to increase the

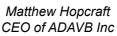

The Story of Dandenong Creek from Knox Historical Society

The Dandenong Creek is long regarded as forming the western and northern boundaries of the City of Knox. Street directories show a sometimes wriggly, sometimes straight yellow line from just east of Stud Rd, Rowville to Sheffield Rd, The Basin; the Post office uses it to delineate Post Code 3152 from 3133 or 3135 and Knox Council encloses Collier Ward in part by the creek.

In Wantirna, north off Selkirk Ave down to the creek is J W Manson Reserve. The Heathmont History



Group's recent publication 'The European History of Dandenong Creek from Bayswater Road to Boronia Road' points out that this Reserve is not in our City but was sold in 1994/95 and is within the City of Maroondah. At that time there were few sports grounds in that part of Maroondah but a great demand. James Manson (1908-1974) was elected to the Victorian parliament representing the Liberal Party in 1955. At 1958 the election successfully he transferred from the Hawthorn to the Ringwood electorate, finally retiring from politics in 1973. He served as Minister for **Development** State from 1965 to 1970 when he then held the Tourism ministry for a short time.

Three ovals provide grounds for St. Andrew's Cricket Club which also shares a brick pavilion with the

Ringwood City Soccer Club. Another pavilion is home to the Germen Shepherd Dog Club, Eastern Branch whilst the Ringwood Community Garden is nearby. Significant bushland to the west was not included in the land sale. (Manson Nature Reserve). In total the entire park measures over 4.5 hectares.

The creek, although stripped of its natural vegetation, provides a corridor for birds (including a reported sighting of the vulnerable Royal Spoonbill) and insects; the remnant bush hosts Sugar Gliders, bats and possums; the billabong habitat provides for yabbies, frogs and waterbirds and the tall trees and the adjoining Healesville Freeway reservation

provides food sites for Black-shouldered Kites. In the nature reserve care needs to be taken to ensure threats are controlled:

- environmental weeds (blackberry, watsonia, buttercup and garden escapees
- foot traffic
- loss of tree hollows to feral interlopers.

An added concern is that of small population sizes of both flora and fauna.

News from the Australian Jazz Museum

Proactively Collecting, Archiving and Disseminating Australian Jazz.

Australia's Greatest Jazz Export by Ken Simpson-Bull

IT is generally accepted that Jazz began in New Orleans in the early part of the 20th century. This new and exciting music quickly spread throughout the United States and indeed, around the world. By the 1920s, Australia possessed quite a number of active jazz bands.

What is generally not known is that Australia has actually exported jazz back to the United States. A multi-instrumentalist jazz performer who has been called "Australia's most successful Jazz Export" was Errol Buddle who sadly passed away at his home in Sydney in February this year at age 89.

Errol, who had a promising career in Australia playing saxophone, bassoon and flute with a variety of bands, travelled to Windsor, Ontario in 1952 where he formed, along with some talented fellow Australians, "The Australian Jazz Quintet". Playing mainly modern jazz, they developed a large following in clubs, concerts and on national radio.

The group was booked into all the top jazz clubs from coast to coast in the US including Birdland,

Basin Street and Blue Note in New York and eventually became the fifth most popular group in America. They were placed three years running in the prestigious Downbeat Magazine poll in the Tenor Sax Section and in the Miscellaneous Section on Bassoon.

In the clubs they played opposite Count Basie, Dave Brubeck, Miles Davis, Ella Fitzgerald and Billie Holiday. They also played concert performances at all the main concert halls in America including Carnegie Hall in New York where they gave a total of six performances.

The Australian Jazz Museum has recognised the achievements of Errol Buddle and the Australian Jazz Quintet with an extensive biographical article in its latest quarterly magazine.

Pete Mitchell is a local full time musician who has lived in Knoxfield happily for around 16 years and has been performing professionally with various bands around Australia and overseas for the last 20 years. Pete, a saxophonist, plays a vast variety of styles and loves fronting his own jazz ensembles as much as he does being a sideman in other people's bands.

Pete has recently commenced playing with his jazz trio at the newly opened bar The Bavarian at Knox Ozone on Wednesday nights. Pete says "It's a fantastic pub which has a German theme with the food & beer and getting a chance to perform at a local place so close to home is fantastic!" Pete has played at The Bavarian six times so far and is keen for locals to know that there is live music happening in the area.

Pete tours and records with Aria award winning band, Melbourne Ska Orchestra which has toured the UK, Canada, USA & Turkey including performances at world famous festivals such as Glastonbury & the Montréal Jazz Festival with audiences of up to 60,000 people!
