## News from Aussie Vets

We closed for 3 weeks over the Christmas period and like many organisations we continued to provide assistance for our veterans using the raised funds. All of our volunteers who work to provide services to the veteran community for welfare and advocacy assistance were called on over the Christmas period.

The bush fires have taken our whole community by surprise and we, like many other organisations, provided assistance where we could. We had some direct involvement with a number of veterans affected by the fires. But what we supported was a group of sixty to ninety veterans who gathered together to provide direct assistance to those caught up in the fires. We provided financial assistance to the main body group "Veteran Assist" to directly help those working on the ground with clean up and provision of meals.

We were also contacted by a veteran to get blankets and towels to assist treating the injured wild life from the fire which we were able to provide from the Op shop.

As an organisation we have always made a point of assisting the general community even though our primary focus is veterans. We are also having meetings to see what we can do as the clean-up and rebuild takes place. At this stage we look like providing a cooked meal to the volunteers who assist with the rebuilding of fences after the fires.

We know there is no quick fix after the devastation of the fires and, like the rest of the community, we will step up where we can.

I would like to thank our volunteers who help run the shop, those that donate quality goods for sale and also those that patronise the shop.

### Steamfest 2020

A visit to the Melbourne Steam Traction Engine Club's Steamfest is a great family day out with appeal to all ages from train loving toddlers to reminiscing seniors. Live music and food stalls add to the atmosphere.

Steamfest, over the labour day long weekend is the highlight of the year for the club. It showcases the achievements of the dedicated volunteers who put in thousands of hours each year maintaining and developing the club museum.

These days the "Steam" in the name deceptive. The is steam exhibits are impressive and were the original focus of the club but over the past 55 years the range of the collection has expanded to cover a wide range of fascinating engines, tools and machinery. You will see mechanical marvels from the steam era through to jet engines.

It is club policy to show engines and equipment working wherever possible. Big moblle steam engines and tractors will parade round the grounds. The engines that drove

our early industry, both steam and diesel will be operating. Around the site the comprehensive collection of earth moving equipment can be seen in operation with daily demonstrations of the big walking dragline. This amazing machine has no tracks or wheels but walks along on big feet.

If weather conditions permit the huge steam ploughing engines will demonstrate how farm land was developed in the early 1900's by winding the double ended plough back and forth across a field. In contrast working draught horses show how it was done when all horse power came from horses. Tractors show more recent methods. Other engines can be seen driving hay balers, rock crushers and pumps. The club's blacksmiths put on an impressive display of their craft, as do collectors.

The club's blacksmiths put on an impressive display of their craft, as do collectors of model engines and vintage tools. Kids love to play at starting and stopping the trains on the model railway display.

The miniature railway and tractor rides are always popular with the children and those keen to save their legs going up to see the top paddock displays. It is hoped to have the new extension to the rail track opened in time for the event.

Club members have been very active over the last year and there are impressive

new developments to be seen. For the first time the team that has restored the engines from the Steam Tug Lyttelton II will have them operating on steam. Seeing those big three cylinder marine engines turning over on steam is quite something. Next to the tug display the equally huge early 3 cylinder Willans diesel is well on the way to being reassembled.

There are military displays, boats on the lake, vintage cars and more besides.

Steamfest runs from 10am to 5pm on the 7th 8th and 9th of March at 1200 Ferntree Gully Rd Scoresby.

## Little Street Library Project at Wantirn Mall

"TAKE a Book, GIVE a book, SHARE a book" Rotary Club of Boronia's Little Street Library project

The Rotary Club of Boronia celebrated 50 years of Service above self to the Boronia and KNOX communities on April 25th, 2018. The Club wanted to give something educational and lasting back to the local community and decided to have built and installed, 3 Little Street Libraries to encourage the local community to "Take a Book, Give a book and Share a book".

Little Street libraries are a worldwide phenomena that started in London using old phone booths to encourage people to share their unwanted books and encourage people to get off their phones!. The Australian library community started a Street Library association, and the Rotary Club of Boronia has registered our libraries with the group. The Group has a website www.streetlibrary. org.au and once registered the Libraries are listed on the site including directions to each

library. To date over 1400 Little Street Libraries are registered with the Association, some in public places, and some in people's front gardens.



Boronia Rotary Club has a relationship with the Diamond Creek Men's Shed as past Club member Leigh Marshall started the shed and as such we commissioned the Shed to produce 3 Little Libraries.

Once built the Club then approached 3 local Primary schools, Boronia Heights PS, St Joseph's PS, Boronia and Regency Park Primary School, Wantirna

> to decorate the Libraries. The club made that decision as research indicated that libraries decorated by children of the local community do not get graffitied.

> The third Little Library was launched on Friday 13th December in front of The King Bean Cafe by KNOX Mayor, Cr Nicole Seymour and Ward Councilor, Cr Marcia Timmers-Leitch with assistance by Student leaders from Regency Park Primary School who painted the Library. This Library was built with a grant from the Knox Council for Minor projects.

> Filling the Libraries was done initially though book donations from members and friends of both adult and children's books, but once the communities became aware of the "free" books they are now self seeding. Club members regularly visit and add books, if needed, but all are now almost self sufficient and no damage has been inflicted on either library.

The Little Street Library has increased the exposure of the Club in the local community and has been a very satisfying project for our Club. For more information on the Rotary Club of Boronia please see the Club's Website or Facebook page.

I am very pleased to announce the BRAND NEW Designs for the upgraded Playgrounds that are coming to Juniper Road and Inchcape Avenue in Wantirna.

We asked the residents what they wanted and were delighted with the ideas and enthusiastic response that we received.

The overwhelming feedback told us that the new play equipment needed to be designed for young children and bigger kids in mind, that there needed to be adequate seating and/or picnic table under a shelter, more shrubs and trees for natural shade and open areas of grass so kids can run around or kick a ball.

Safety was also a key concern with priority on keeping the design open to allow for good visibility and incorporating fencing along the main road to make the reserve safer for families.

Construction of both of these playgrounds is due to start in February with proposed completion ready for use by June. Can't wait!

#### **Knox Community Chess Enthusiasts (KCCE)**

As an active member of the Knox community for more than 42 years, Eddie Atacador realised he wanted to do something more for the community.

What began as a social game between Eddie and his nephew each week at Westfield, gradually grew into a larger group playing chess as a way to socialise.

'It started with two people then just grew and grew" says Eddie, 'We enjoy it, it's become a social hub. Some of our players are young but most of them are retired - the older ones teach the next generation.'

As the group grew, so too did the demand for more equipment and a regular meeting point. Council connected Eddie with the Coonara Community House who manage the Westfield Community Space. Through Council's Community Development Fund, the KCCE received a \$1500 grant which was used to purchase tables, time clocks, chess sets, a giant chess set, promotional t-shirts and a filing cabinet for the chess equipment.

Known as the Knox Community Chess Enthusiasts (KCCE) the group meet every Thursday (PLUS every 1st Saturday of the month) at the Westfield Community Space from 10:30am. They also meet every Friday at the Rowville Library (Stud Park) from 12:30pm.


## Small School Big Heart!






### Wantirna Primary School is Wantirna's Best Kept Secret

BAYSWATER NEWS

The devastation of the recent fires in different states of Australia created discussion with my husband, Alan a Bayswater CFA Member and now retired, to discuss the fire calls in the 1970/80s.

Bayswater CFA didn't start operating until 1969 so the equipment was nothing like it is today. Dennis Gilbert, the owner of the BP Garage, corner of Highmoor Avenue and Mountain Highway, Bayswater allowed the Brigade to place a tin garage in his backyard for a Fire Station. A phone system in Dennis's garage enabled fire calls for Bayswater's area to be received via the Boronia CFA. Installed by the Brigade on BP's roof was an air raid siren and Dennis was able to activate it when necessary. Turning out to a call could only occur if a firefighter was in earshot and could hear the siren. At night the calls went to one of the firefighter's home and he also installed a siren.



As the Brigade advanced, a Fire Reporting System was introduced via the telephone. The plan was for six firefighter's homes to be connected to the FRS and six other homes, just a bell. The calls came through Boronia as before but this time to the houses. Several years later the Fire Brigade moved their tin garage to



land at the entrance to the Bayswater Railway Station siding in Scoresby Road. The FRS system was still operative but now when a firefighter arrived at the Station the siren was turned off. The call from the householder would then be relayed to the firefighter. The calls to the six homes had a different sound so it was obvious it was a fire call and needed to be answered and the siren set off.

Tuesday nights at 8 pm. was siren testing time and would be sounded three times. Residents of Bayswater knew of this test and that it was not a fire call. Sunday morning at 10 am. was a radio test through the Knox Group plus FRS via the phones. The Firefighters answered the radios in the trucks and the householders answered the FRS. In later years all the Brigade Members were issued with a pager and received the calls this way. The two photos show a small brick dwelling on Mountain Highway, Wantirna opposite Trash and Treasure. This was the highest point in the City of Knox and operated as a signal for the radios. If you are passing this building is still there but not in use.

## Jackson Taylor Update

2020 has not been the start to the year we would have hoped for.

We have seen much of Victoria affected by devastating bushfires with tragic loss of life and of property. We have also seen the best of Victoria and of Victorians. In the light of such tragedy we have come together to support those who need it most and will need to for some time yet. And let's not forget the wonderful volunteer and career firefighters and all emergency service workers who have been on the frontline. Our community thanks you for sacrifices you've made and we remember your fallen colleagues who've paid the ultimate sacrifice protecting communities.

I also want to pay tribute to some special people in our community – those who care for others. They are an integral part of our lives and so many family and wider community members rely on them each day. That is why the Andrews Government is providing an additional 5,000 Victorian carers with 100,000 hours of respite each year. This, along with further funding to ensure they have additional emotional support when required is so important to provide the care they also need.

Locally, I was proud to help secure \$38,480 for local organisations which will go toward helping connect carers to programs, better support them and identify their needs.

It is important to touch on the critically important work of the Mental Health Royal Commission who recently

Funds Flow To Bayswater Schools

Jackson Taylor, MP for Bayswater, was recently pleased to announce over \$685,000 of funding, going towards six local schools.

Boronia K-12 College, Eastern Ranges School, Marlborough Primary School, The Basin Primary School, Bayswater Secondary College and Regency Park Primary School will all be benefitting from additional funds, secured by Mr. Taylor.

The funding is a part of the Andrews Government's Inclusive Schools and Inclusive Equipment Funding programs. Hundreds of schools right across Victoria will be benefitting from over \$75 million in total funding across both programs.

Mr. Taylor spoke to each principal once this funding was announced to share the good news.

Mr. Taylor said "I'm rapt to have been able to secure

handed down its interim report and the government, as promised, is implementing each and every single one. A damning comment made by a Commissioner was that 'The system has reached a point where it simply cannot help those who turn to it – let alone those in crisis. 



### Fire Safety Top-of-mind as Knox Community Responds Generously

The bushfire crisis across Victoria and around the country has dominated headlines this summer. Those who have been impacted directly will need ongoing support and care as they deal with the immediate threat and later, as they begin to rebuild.

There are also many who may not have experienced a direct impact or loss but are experiencing bereavement as a result of witnessing this loss of life, land and wildlife. In this time of great tragedy, we have seen the very best of the Knox community.

Council has been inundated with messages from residents looking for ways they can support bushfire relief efforts. Members of local emergency services including the Ferntree Gully CFA and Scoresby Fire Brigade have attended the fires in East Gippsland providing on-the-ground support to those fighting the bushfires and witnessing the horrific conditions first-hand.

Local clubs and community organisations have held fundraisers and collected donations to support impacted families and communities.

Knox City Council Mayor, Cr Nicole Seymour said that the response has been testament to the character of Knox

"We are a community that truly cares about our natural environment and about each other," said Cr Seymour.

"The true sense of mateship, generosity and compassion within the Knox community has shone during this time of incredible hardship.

Here in the foothills of the Dandenong Ranges, our natural landscape is precious to us and the threat of fire is all too close to home for many."

"The phenomenal generosity we have seen from Knox locals truly illustrates our community's willingness to pitch in and lend a helping hand wherever it is needed. I thank everyone who has contributed in any way they can during this time."

Knox Council has also responded to calls for support from impacted municipalities providing resourcing assistance with response and relief efforts such as deploying staff to support East Gippsland Shire.

We will continue to work with the Municipal Association of Victoria regarding further assistance required over the coming weeks and months as the impacted areas begin recovery efforts.

Those who still wish to provide support are reminded that monetary donations are the best way to ensure your contribution goes to helping those effected by the bushfires.

Fire knows no borders. Successfully mitigating the risks of bushfire in Knox requires a collaborative effort and partnerships with neighbouring councils, emergency services and other responsible agencies to protect our communities, as well as the many land owners within our city.

Reducing fire risk is about being ready. It's about preparing our land, our property and our people to eliminate risk factors and respond quickly and decisively.

Some of the ongoing activities coordinated by Council to assess and remove fire risks include property inspections in the Bushfire Management Overlay (BMO), green area and open space maintenance (including controlled burns where appropriate) and our continued Emergency Management planning processes.

The World Day of Prayer 2020 host country is Zimbabwe and the theme is "Rise! Take Your Mat and Walk".

Zimbabwe is a landlocked plateau country in the southern part of Africa. It is bordered by South Africa, Botswana, Zambia and Mozambique. Its' climate varies by altitude.

Zimbabwe's capital is Harare and it is the largest city followed by Bulawayo. The country has over 16 million people. English is the official language but it is only spoken as the first language by 2% of the population. 70% speak Shona. 20% speak Ndebele. There are many other recognised languages.

Religion: The current Zimbabwean Constitution allows for freedom of worship and freedom of association. There is separation between state and church. Christianity is the major religion observed by more than 80 percent of the population. It was introduced with British colonisation. The other 20 percent observe Islam, African traditional religion and Judaism.

Major tourist attractions include Victoria Falls, Hwange National Park, and the Great Zimbabwe Monument or Ruins from which the country derives its name.

Zimbabwe's major industry is mining of natural resources such as coal, gold, platinum, copper, nickel, tin, clay, and diamonds. Some of the country's produce is corn, cotton, tobacco, wheat, coffee, sugar cane, peanuts, and raises sheep, goats, pigs, poultry and cattle.



Zimbabwe exports cotton, tobacco, gold, ferro alloys and ivory; it imports machinery, vehicles, chemicals and fuels. However, with political upheaval, the economy of Zimbabwe has shrunk

significantly and most of the industries are closed. Zimbabwe's currency has gone from hyperinflation, to being abandoned in favour of the US dollar, to being reinstated in an effort to stabilise their own currency, all in recent times.

The country of Zimbabwe has been in the news recently. The newly elected president has been sworn in after a tense and disputed election. Churches and ecumenical organizations are actively promoting peace education and civic awareness to engage the communities in peaceful participation. Prayer vigils, election monitoring and dialogues between civil society and the government were organised to have political transparency and to promote healing in a country that searches for peace and reconciliation.

### Aston Shield Presentation from The Hon Alan Tudge, Federal Member for Aston.

At the end of each year, I have the pleasure of recognising some of our great young citizens in the Studfield and Wantirna area through the presentation of the Aston Shield.

In each school, the Shield is awarded to a student for good citizenship; someone who has demonstrated compassion, a commitment to others, and who has been a great role model for their school and community.

The Aston Shield is awarded in the spirit of Tilly Aston, who was a remarkable woman in Australian history who did so much for the welfare of blind people. The Federal Electorate of Aston (which covers most of Knox) is named after her.

Tilly was born in 1873 and was completely blind by the age of seven. Yet, despite her obvious challenges, Tilly's courage and tenacity brought great advancement for blind and vision impaired people. She secured voting rights, better access to public transport, and established the first braille library. (Tilly herself had to drop out of university because there were no braille books). Finally, she

set up Vision Australia – an organisation that still exists today and helps tens of thousands of people each year.

I am very proud of our young winners. If Tilly were alive today, I am sure that she would also be very proud.

Kind Words From Laughter Club Members

Hello and welcome to the New Year and a new decade. Time can be healing and I personally have gained a lot in many ways since deciding to lead a laughter club fifteen years ago this coming April. It started for me when I saw people on TV laughing uproariously, sharing fun and joy with others and it was the best decision. I had no idea what I was getting myself into but strongly loved the idea of laughing together with people in a group situation.

This article is written an an appeal to readers who are shy, inhibited, feel isolated and would enjoy belonging to a supportive social group.

The reason for this focus is that so many people who read or hear about the benefits of laughter, or Laughter Yoga as it is commonly called, would benefit from attending laughter clubs but are held back by fear.

I particularly want to share some kind words sent to me as a text the day after a laughter club session. It impacted me when I received it, especially because the writer is a lady who is a quiet, gentle, shy person. When she first came three years ago she had been in a depression for ten years until she decided it was time to try to turn her life around. She took a stand and turned up at the laughter club in black clothes. We credit her resilience and willingness to get out of her comfort zone and never give up.

Her text offered an opportunity to pass on her spontaneous words and give you a notion of what can be achieved. Her words are genuine and spontaneous and a great example of what adding regular laughter to your life can offer and which is frequently transformational.

"Wow. I am really pleased I met you all three years ago. You have made a real difference in my life. This week I bought more bright clothes and I wore my gold shoes on Saturday. I would never have worn gold shoes prior to three years ago. Another thing. I danced for the first time at the jazz afternoon at the Village Green. That was another first since my wedding in

1984. See how you have both turned my life around. A big thank you. XXX"

The reference to jazz and dancing is because the laughter club go out together as well. Some members comment that they would never do so without going out in a group.

Other kind words to share - another regular lady has been coming for four years in May when we met at World Laughter Day. She was looking for something, did not know what and felt it could be the answer. "It has added a lot of joy to my life, something that wasn't there before. And I won't stop!"

Age is no barrier for you coming, the youngest member is four and oldest 80. There is a good range of age and we are mostly women and three men. It may be easier for women to embrace the spirit of laughter and wellbeing than the men, who are usually more introverted.

Does this inspire you to come along or put it on your bucket list? Let's hope so. There is no time like the present. We will welcome you and please contact me with any questions. Thank you. Much love. Lynette.

### Back to school back pain



### Getting children's feet ready for school

The foot is a complex structure of 26 bones and 35 joints held together with many ligaments and muscles. Children begin to walk between 8 to 18 months and are usually flat-footed with inwards turning in feet. As bones and muscles strengthen and develop the posture of the foot and lower limb advances until the shape of the adult foot is reached at the age of six years old.

The easiest thing you can do to keep your children's feet healthy at school is having appropriate footwear fitted. When choosing shoes look at the elements of the shoe. The shoe should only bend at the sole where the foot bends, at the forefoot, they should not be too flexible. The shoe should have a firm heel counter and be wide enough for the forefoot. The length is also important. A thumbs width of space at the end of the longest toe when standing allows for enough room for toes. Shoes should also have laces or a strap to hold the foot in place and stop clawing of the toes. It's important to match the shoes for the activity they are to be used for, the period of time, the required support and the ground surfaces.

Common walking issues should be assessed by a Podiatrist if they cause pain in the feet, tripping or limping. Excessive in-toeing can be caused by several different issues such as hip joint problems. If the in-toeing is severe, seems to involve the

leg and hip as well as the foot, or isn't improving by 1.5 to 2 years of age, see a Podiatrist for an assessment. Occasionally, some children walk with outward turned feet. In most causes this can self-resolve, but see your podiatrist if you are concerned.

### Dinsdale Family Reunion by Chris Day

Many Residents know the name "Dinsdale" whether they vote in Dinsdale Council Ward or go to parks or roads named after the family or have visited Knox Historical Society at Ambleside in Ferntree Gully and seen the Dinsdale truck.

The family originally ran orchards which were in the area where, today, the Ward is named after them. At one stage the orchards were spread over most of the area from roughly Stud Road to Scoresby Road.

The family, as it got larger, couldn't financially support all of them with orchards and many of them moved to what is now the Ferntree Gully Village area and some were involved in the wood cutting industry.

The Dinsdale family originally travelled to what we now know as Knox from Yorkshire in Northern England. While family conversation said they were Scottish that was probably because for many years they were on the Scottish side of Hadrian's Wall but there is no Dinsdale Scottish Tartan.

Today you can go to a village in Yorkshire called Hawes near Gayles where the Dinsdale Homestead is.

There are today over 150,000 spread throughout the world with the Dinsdale surname including in Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Canada, USA and France as well as throughout UK.

In November a reunion of Dinsdale family members was held in Ferntree Gully and family members of four generations came from all over Australia to celebrate their heritage. Ambleside opened on a Saturday afternoon and family members spent the afternoon learning more about their great grand parents and the following generations.

Besides Ambleside, a number of family members went to the Ferntree Gully Historical Society Tour of the Ferntree Gully cemetery, always a great experience although a few of the younger generation not sure they enjoyed it or not!

The Dinsdale family members who attended were descendants of Alick Dinsdale (snr) and his wife Martha. Alick (snr) was born in 1896 and lived most of his life in Ferntree Gully. Martha's family originally came to Australia from Finland and she was a Lutheran joining what was a Catholic Family.

In 1928 along with his cousin Fawcett (Fos) they purchased a Chevrolet truck that cost 209 pounds (a lot of money in those days especially in a poor small village that Ferntree Gully was at that time). The truck was purchased for their wood cutting and selling business. The only drivers of the truck were Fos and his son Fawcett (known as Boysie).

In 1929 the great stock market crash occurred followed by the depression that affected the whole world. There was not enough money to support both families and Alick (snr) left the business and went to work for the Shire of Ferntree Gully (on Burwood Hwy opposite Woolworths Supermarket today).

Alick (snr) lived in the house as caretaker behind the Shire Office. He was involved in many of the Shire works during that time including the One Tree Hill Lookout and the 1000 Steps.

During those years Alick (snr) and Martha had 5 boys Bill, Alick (jnr), Roy, Jim and then a gap until Harry who was born several years after his brothers.

All the brothers grew up in Ferntree Gully and all attended the Ferntree Gully Primary School (no longer a school but the original building is part of the housing development on Burwood Hwy).

All the boys played cricket and football for Ferntree Gully Club. With WW2 starting a number of the sons joined up, some changing their ages to get to the great adventure (or so they thought). Alick (jnr) was in the Army for number of years and because he was a Victorian Railways employee at the Newport Rail Yards he was used to help get supplies from the East Coast to West Coast for shipping to North African campaign and to Great Britain. Australia had different rail line gauge widths which created a lot of problems moving goods across Australia.

Once he was able to, he transferred to the RAAF to join his brother Bill in the Australian

Air Force and was moved to Canada for further training before joining the bombing of the Rhine and Germany. They were very lucky that Germany's surrender occurred before they moved to the UK.

With the war over the sons then joined the rush to get married, buy a house and start a family (except Harry at that time). Roy stayed in Ferntree Gully and with wife Bonny had a milk bar on Forest Rd for many years. Roy also worked for Lands Victoria based near Ferntree Gully Football Ground.

Bill was Telecom area manager in various locations for many years, Jim, a mechanic, was a member of Ferntree Gully CFA and eventually moved to full time employment first in Sunbury area later in charge of Mornington Peninsula area which was huge job. Sadly he died in 1983 and even today there are questions about the Fiskeville CFA centre where all members spent a lot of time. There was a huge funeral for Jim attended by all areas of the communities he had volunteered and worked for including the Murdoch family who were great supporters of the CFA and Jim on the Peninsula.

Martha Died in 1951 and Alick (snr) in 1955. Sons Jim and Alick (jnr) in early 1980s were given what was left of the Dinsdale truck by Boysie and the brothers started the renovation. When Jim died he left the truck to his daughter Janice in his will and a few years later, when she was planning to get married and move to Tasmania, Janice and her mother Joan approached Ambleside Historical Society and Knox Council and asked if they would like the vehicle to be returned to Ferntree Gully.

With Jim dying the truck refurbishment was not completed but it was decided that the Council on behalf of the community, would accept the truck and then finish the refurbishment which was completed under the supervision of Knox Council.

The history and photos of this time are on the walls where the truck is today housed.

The brothers have all now passed away except Harry who still lives in East Gippsland close to his two daughters and their families.

Chris Day of Upper Ferntree Gully, husband of Margaret Day only daughter of Alick (jnr) and Lorna Dinsdale who both lived their last few years as residents of Upper Ferntree Gully. Lorna and Alick (jnr) met on the train from Ferntree Gully to the City prior to the war. They married when he returned. Lorna's family was the Baker family, one of the early families to establish a market garden in Bayswater North.

### **Our Nonagenarian Volunteers**

Did you know that the Jazz Museum is run entirely by volunteers? In fact, there are around 50 of them, not all present at the one time. Since the museum is open three days a week (two to the public) and sometimes on a fourth day for Jazz Appreciation courses, the volunteers "spread themselves around". Their duties include the registration and data-base-listing of donated items like sound recordings, videos, musical instruments, books, photographs, memorabilia, and many other items of jazz-related social significance. Of course, all of these items must also be carefully and properly packaged and stored or displayed. Many of the Museum's volunteers are also involved in guiding and assisting visitors, restoration work, and other important tasks.

So what's this about nonagenarians? A nonagenarian is, of course, someone between the ages of 90 and 99, and the Museum has two on staff. Although the average age of the volunteers is probably around sixty, Peter Skafte is 93 and Frank Hambridge is 95, both fit and well.

Frank is a real "jazzer" from way back, having attended jazz functions and dances all his life. He can often be seen at the Victorian Jazz Club's regular

Saturday night functions and, until recently, was always up on the floor dancing. At the museum, Frank operates a computer and is involved in cataloguing donated international records and CDs.

Peter also is involved in cataloguing on a computer. He is a former jazz musician who has played in a variety of bands since the 1940s. In fact, Peter features in a recently released CD from the Museum entitled "Jazz Masters of the 1940s" where he plays clarinet and alto sax with the Michael Walker Band from 1949.






