We warmly invite you to attend the celebrations on Saturday November 19th 1pm -4:30pm.



Building a Better Bayswater from Knox City Council

Knox Council is inviting people who live, work, shop and play in Bayswater to have their say on opportunities to improve the Bayswater shopping precinct and the surrounding area.

Opportunities include revitalising the town centre, expanded outdoor dining and eating spaces, safe connections for pedestrians and cyclists, increased tree planting and potential development of a new community hub.

There is also an opportunity to bring more people and activity to the centre by allowing medium and higher density housing on larger redevelopment sites that would provide more diverse and affordable options for people wanting to live in Bayswater.

Knox Mayor Cr Susan Laukens said bringing more people to the heart of Bayswater would be good for business and create a safer, more vibrant community feel.

"More housing in the central precinct would attract more people to the shopping strip, increasing its vibrancy and desirability as a place to live, work and play," she said.

"Bayswater's population is growing and over the next decade the suburb will need more homes and more diverse housing choices for new residents.

"Allowing for moderate growth in areas close to shops, services and public transport allows us to protect residential neighbourhoods on the fringes of these precincts from inappropriate development," she said.

Cr Laukens said there was a significant opportunity to transform the area known as Penguin Place in to the new town centre of Bayswater.

"This would see streetscape upgrades such as improvements to landscaping, new places to sit down and relax, installation of public art and better connections to the train station for pedestrians and cyclists," she said.

"Bayswater is a hub for services, employment, public transport and housing, and is a destination for convenience shopping, food outlets and retail services.

"In the past 15 years, Bayswater has benefited from the redevelopment of Mountain High Shopping Centre, removal of the level crossing at Mountain Highway and the new Bayswater train station.

Knox City Council Waste Services will be changing from mid-2023 with the introduction of a food and organics service that can include food scraps into your garden waste bin. This change is part of State Government reform for more effective waste management. Council is looking for your feedback to develop



EDUCATION UPDATE

What is the Future for Kindergartens in Knox?

Council is considering its future role as a kindergarten service provider in response to Victorian Government reforms that will increase kindergarten by 15 hours a week for both three and four year olds over the next 10 years. Council operates 29 sessional kindergarten sites at a cost of \$3.3 million per annum. As hours increase, a key challenge will be the requirement for more classrooms and outdoor learning spaces at kindergartens. Knox Mayor Cr Susan Laukens said while Council welcomes the government's reforms, the rising cost of providing kindergarten services is diverting financial resources from other much needed services.

"We recognise that getting children into a formal learning environment at a young age is beneficial for their social, emotional and cognitive development," she said. "Council makes a significant financial investment into kindergarten services and facilities to support children and families but fully funding the additional resources required to implement the reforms is beyond our financial capacity. If Council decides to make any changes to how it provides kindergarten in the future, this will take some time to be implemented and will not affect planned services in 2023. We will convene a demographically representative community panel to ensure a high level of engagement, transparency and accountability in considering a full range of issues relating to kindergarten services. The panel will be informed by feedback provided from kindergarten families and the broader community. We need to ensure feedback is representative of our whole community and the panel will ensure the diverse views and perspectives of our community are heard."

Council will appoint an independent consultant to recruit and facilitate the community panel.

The community will be invited to provide feedback on what Council should consider as part of the service review. This will commence in October.



Judith Durham was a Jazzer

The recent death of Judith Durham at age 79 was sad news for all those who fondly remember her career with the world-famous Seekers. But the Seekers were only active over a period of less than eight years. Many are not aware of Judith's other career as a solo vocalist, particularly as a jazz singer, over a period that lasted much longer.

After she obtained her A. Mus. A. on piano while still a teenager, she occasionally sang and played the piano publicly. She began singing jazz with the University jazz band and was then given the position of vocalist with Frank Traynor's popular Jazz Preachers. She also appeared on television and sang with the John Hawes and Sny Chambers jazz bands.

Her world fame came after she joined the Seekers although she has said that she preferred jazz singing. After the Seekers ended in 1968 she returned to jazz and blues singing, especially with her English pianist husband Ron Edgeworth. Because Australians related her solo performances to the Seekers and not to her jazz appearances, she and her husband went to the United States in 1972 where they were warmly received at various well-known jazz venues. After returning home she continued to perform and record professionally until illness forced her retirement several years ago.

Kim Wells News Spot

The passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II resonated with so many of us. I was saddened but also profoundly grateful for her exceptional service as a world leader, her long reign of peace and stability for Commonwealth nations and her contribution to over six hundred charities. Following Westminster tradition, Victorian Members of Parliament all swore their oath of allegiance to the new King Charles. As a Queen's Scout, we will retain the name we were awarded and from now, Scouts receiving the top award in Scouting will be known as King Scouts. The Queen was present throughout the fabric of our lives, across the events of our lives in a way that has struck a deep chord for many people. May she rest in peace.

Like any footy tragic, September is one of my favourite times of the year, with local footy finals and AFL finals to enjoy. Local clubs are thriving with a flock of younger members signing up to play. It's been great to acknowledge talented up-and-coming players at the award presentations for Under 16 girls and Under 13 boys teams at the Knox Churches Soccer Club (now more than 500 members strong!) and present the 2022 Seniors Club Best and Fairest trophy to Michael Dunlop. I also presented the Damian McKeogh Memorial award to Jen Waryszczuk at the Scoresby Football & Netball Club for her huge contribution to the running of the club. Congratulations to Jen, Michael and the KCSC soccer teams!

With so many of us travelling to events, busy traffic and spring weather bringing lots of rain, safer roads are a huge issue. Residents regularly ask me what is being done about the terrible condition of our local roads. Large potholes and worn-down road surfaces on Ferntree Gully Road are creating hazardous driving conditions for Knoxfield and Scoresby drivers.

I've taken residents' concerns to Victoria's Roads & Road Safety Minister and spoken in Parliament about our crumbling local roads and the impact of budget cuts on road maintenance. Despite the appalling condition of Ferntree Gully Road, residents are still waiting for urgent road resurfacing. It's so frustrating that an important arterial road isn't safely maintained for Knoxfield and Scoresby residents. Parents, students and teachers at Carrington Primary School rely on this road, as do hundreds of employees and transport operators in our local manufacturing and commercial businesses. I am committed to fixing this within the first 100 days of a Liberal Nationals' led government in Victoria.

I am also committed to fast-track permanent upgrades for safer roads. Delays finishing the turning lanes at the intersection of Henderson Road and Ferntree Gully Road are simply not good enough. Henderson Road intersection upgrade received full Federal funding to lengthen the turning lanes and complete the Henderson Road Bridge Project. Drivers travelling on Ferntree Gully Road are often unable to pass vehicles waiting to turn into Henderson Road. Residents have waited nearly three years after the Bridge was finished in October 2019 for the new turning lanes to open on Ferntree Gully Road and to use the lights at the Kelletts Road end.

I am committed to completing these missing pieces of the Henderson Road upgrade under a Liberal Nationals government to let traffic flow for Ferntree Gully Road again. Safer roads are my priority and will receive proper funding under a Matt Guy Liberal National government.

My plan for Safer Roads for local drivers:

- Urgent resurfacing of Ferntree Gully Road to fix potholes
- Fast-track completion of Henderson Road turning lanes to keep traffic flowing on Ferntree Gully Road

What's been happening at the Ringwood Field Naturalists Club??

Meeting: July - Speaker: Dr Lindy Lumsden "Bats: **Fascinating Creatures of the Night"**

Lindy commenced with the natural history of microbats, of which there 24 species recorded for Victoria with 16 species found in Greater Melbourne. She talked about how they feed and fly (and just how high some actually get) as well as their use of ultrasonic echolocation, almost all well outside human hearing range. She further explained how the scientists eavesdrop on the bats to record movement and numbers.

The most common species in Greater Melbourne are the Gould's Wattled Bat and the Lesser long-eared Bat. Lindy concluded her presentation by showing a few of her small bats to those present.

Excursion: July - Badger Weir Leaders - Don and Sandra R

Twenty-one members went on the excursion. It was a bit wet and windy but we enjoyed seeing the ferns, fungi and a few birds. We also found a Mountain Helmet Orchid. In the afternoon some members travelled to Mt Riddell, where the sun came out for a while and the wind dropped. Several birds were seen, along with a Mosquito Orchid.

Meeting: August - Speaker: Don Redman "South West Western Australia"

Don spoke about a trip he and Sandra had made in spring 2019. They spent three weeks exploring the south-west area on the lookout for orchids. 87 species were sighted on the trip. Beautiful native flowers Banksia coccinea by Alison were also seen. They also

saw a number of Western Australian birds such as the White-breasted Robin, varieties of wrens and a large mixed flock of Carnaby's and Baudin's Cockatoos near Two People's Bay. A number of nocturnal animals including a Bilby were seen in a sanctuary at Dryandra.

Speaker: Peter Rogers-"Is it a tortoise or a turtle?" Peter started his talk by saying that All Tortoises are Turtles, but not all Turtles are Tortoises. He explained by saying the basic difference is that Tortoises spend most of their life on land and have more rounded and domed shells. Turtles are aquatic animals, with a flatter, thinner shell, spending their life in water and only coming ashore to lay eggs. Peter provided

an insight into the anatomy of these animals. He mentioned there are 42 species of turtles in Australia with 2 introduced species. Every Australian State has a number of species with 8 species recorded for Victoria.

Excursion: August - Heathcote - Pink Cliffs -Helen and Graeme F

For our August excursion we travelled up the highway to Heathcote to visit the Pink Cliffs Geological Reserve. The reserve itself is really interesting and gives a lot of insight into gold mining back in the day. Heathcote is a wonderful town to visit.

The weather was a bit gloomy but it didn't deter our group. We did the walks at Pink Cliffs, serenaded by bush birds and adding two orchid species to the morning. We then moved to the other side of town for a picnic lunch.

A short post-lunch walk in the State Park saw different birds and some early spring flowering plants.

We then drove to the Seymour Bushland Reserve, encountering quite heavy rain on the drive. Thankfully the rain had passed by the time we arrived, and the afternoon walk was enjoyed by all. Walking along the bush tracks to the dam we found large areas of Pterostylis nana (Dwarf Greenhoods). the dam area we saw lots of birds, including different varieties of honey eaters and a Whistling Kite circling overhead with a Little Eagle.

Meeting: September - President's address Jack Airey. A short AGM was held, with Jack then giving us the President's address, titled ."Orchids of the local district'.

The restrictions of the lockdowns during the pandemic, confined us to areas within 5 kms of our homes. Jack, therefore, looked much closer to home for orchids, as he was unable to go to other orchid hot spots.

He gave us a guided tour of a number of parks and reserves near his home in Warranwood, acknowledging how fortunate he was to have such places within the 5 km radius. He showed us a number of images taken at each location to give us a sense of the varieties of orchids that are there to see at different times of the year. While the list of orchids he saw in these places is impressive, Jack said there are still a number of orchids he has not seen in the local area, and he will continue visiting the reserves at different times of the year to see what he can find.

Excursion: Brisbane Ranges Leaders Alison and Peter R

Seventeen members enjoyed a wonderful day around the Brisbane Ranges. Orchids were abundant with 11 or more species found in flower and a number of leaves of other species. In some cases the orchids formed small carpets on the ground. Lovely to see specimen's of the amazing red Brisbane Ranges spider orchid. Pea flowers and Pomaderris were colourful understorey plants along with many wattles species in flower. Although we only had a bird count of 28, we could hear many, including honeyeaters, currawongs and parrots. There was a brief sighting of a Spotted Quail-thrush.

The Next meeting: Wednesday 12th October. Speaker: Ian Moodie - "Insects; so much more than 'just a nuisance'!"

As you can see we have a very varied program and members enjoy learning a little about nature and this wonderful country we live in. Meetings are held on the second Wednesday of each month at 7-30pm in Room 4 at Maroondah Federation Estate, Greenwood Ave, Ringwood (Melway 49 H10). All visitors are welcome. Laughing is a physical exercise with many benefits that together, make us healthier and less prone to sickness. Engaging in fun together brings about positivity, reducing negativity and anxiety as our immune system strengthens. You will agree it is nicer to live life happily and healthily, instead of in sickness and isolation.

Laughter Yoga is a most beneficial aerobic activity, particularly to safeguard yourself from viruses as it strengthens the immune system. It is recommended to laugh for at least 20 minutes a day, so make it a regular habit and coming to laughter club helps with this. You will become more light-hearted. My husband John and I deliberately do fun things to share laughter, which are often silly and childlike. That is the beauty of the laughter club, we relearn how to have simple, childlike fun.

10 Ways to Incorporate Laughter Into Your Daily Life is a resource that I can send you if you request it. Here are ideas to bring more light-heartedness and laughter into your life to make laughter a daily habit. They exclude jokes and teach us simple ways to be able to laugh more every day.

(1) Smile genuine smiles - Greet strangers with a smile, which may turn into laughter. (2) Find ways that fit in your lifestyle - laugh when you do simple things such as opening a door, stopping at traffic lights, making the bed. (3) Wake up laughter - Before getting out of bed, remember something funny or you are grateful for and laugh for five minutes. (4) Gratitude laugh - Laugh or smile whenever you express gratitude. (5) Join a laughter club!


Laughter clubs are very welcoming, and people are amazing, lovely, friendly and they attend often



Footwear that properly supports and fits your feet is essential for healthy pain free feet and can prevent or alleviate many foot problems. There are many types of footwear available in shops that cannot be very good or supportive for your feet

When choosing shoes look at the elements of the shoe. The shoe should only bend at the sole where the foot bends at the forefoot, not too flexible, the shoe should have a firm heel counter, wide enough for your forefoot, a thumb width of space at the end of the longest toe when standing, have laces or a strap and ideally a removable innersole liner. The footwear must also match the activity that you are using them for, the period of time, the required support and the ground surfaces.

For example, hard surfaces such as concrete can cause pain and tend to develop pressure areas on the feet. People who stand for long periods on hard surfaces benefit from a supportive shoe with soft innersoles. People at risk of injuring their feet through trauma maybe required to use steel capped boots to prevent injury especially when working with heavy weights or sharp objects. People who play sports should have shoes that provide cushioning for shock absorption and for medial and lateral stability.

High heels can place significant stress on your body by positioning the foot, back and neck into unnatural positions resulting in permanent posture changes. High-heeled shoes also places greater pressure on the forefoot, which can cause corns and callosities. A pointed high heel toe can press against the toes and toe nail causing permanent deformities.

There are also additional elements in footwear to look out for if your feet have specific needs or deformities. If you suffer from bunions, arthritis or claw toes extra depth and width footwear may help alleviate your symptoms. 
