Our Team attended the Annual Conference of the Community Newspaper Association (CNAV) in October. https://cnav.org.au

The conference was held at the Mercure Hotel in North Melbourne, the host being North & West Melbourne News.

Over 60 delegates from across Victoria, representing 30 papers, attended.

Keynote Speaker was CNAV President, James Poyner, Editor of Warrandyte Diary and Deputy Editor of Manningham & Nillumbik Bulletin. The subject was "The State of Community Media".

James explained since locally based commercial newspapers are no longer printing, how important it is that Community owned newspapers are and that they are proving to be more resilient because these newspapers are trusted by their readers.

Community Newspapers are low on resources as most are run by Volunteers who live in their respective communities.

Although the majority have little funds, their costs are low, making the papers free in most communities. Workshops held in the morning and the afternoon were:

• The better way to report on Mental Health issues.

• Cybersecurity: practicing it and writing about it. All workshops were well attended.

We operate three animal welfare shelters that provide refuge and strive to give more than 11,000 animals each year a second chance. We rely on the generous support of the community for more than 90% of our operating expenses.

Kerryn Janson, Manager of the Bayswater store, said she loves meeting and working with the local community.

"We had such a positive reception from Bayswater locals when we opened our doors nearly six months ago, and we're very grateful for their support," Ms Foley said. "This will be our first Christmas in Bayswater, and we need more volunteers to help run the store during this busy time."

RSPCA Op Shops are known for stocking a wide range of items at bargain prices, with the Bayswater store recently stocking new high-quality linen brands, plus items from Tarocash, Tiger Lily, and Jagged.

"There's always a treasure to be found – but don't wait too long to grab any items you've got your eye on, or you might miss out!" Ms Janson said.

Speaking about RSPCA Op Shops, Op-Shop Network Manager Liz Irvine said the stores are a fantastic part of the local community.

"RSPCA Victoria op shops are a vital source of funding for our work preventing cruelty to animals across the state.

Jackson Taylor Update

It's that time of year again when we start counting down to Christmas. But there's always lots to do before we get there. And on a brief personal note, for my partner Tash and I, that now includes our newborn son George, who arrived not too long ago. Tash and George are doing wonderfully and we're super excited he's here! Now adding 'proud Dad' to my role. Thanks for all the well wishes too - it's been wonderful.

Container Deposit Refund Scheme

Victoria's Container Deposit Scheme is now officially up and running, with a new reverse vending machine installed locally at Mitre 10 on Mountain Hwy in Bayswater (pictured).

You'll be able to get a 10-cent refund for every eligible can, carton, and bottle you return. There are many locations now open locally with more coming online soon! For more information, visit https://cdsvic.org. au/

Investing in Community Sport

The brand new, female-friendly pavilion at Marie Wallace Reserve is officially open! And not just this but their existing pavilion has been given a ripper fit out and face-lift too! I was stoked to go into bat and lock in \$300,000 from the State Labor Government with contributions from the Federal Government and by Knox City Council - who delivered this project.

The brand-new State Basketball Centre in Knox is nearly complete. The new facilities include, 12 new community courts, elite training facilities, new gymnastics facilities and it'll be open soon. This is a massive partnership between the State Government and Knox Council.

And it was great to meet local clubs at Templeton Reserve with the Minister for Community Sport to hear about their plans. I am proud to back in local clubs and grassroots sport in any way I can.

Housing Reforms

Victoria is growing. We're the fastest growing state in Australia, with our population set to hit 10.3 million by 2051. To ease the housing pressure Victorians are facing, we need to build 2.24 million homes in that time, including a target of 425,600 across regional and rural Victoria. We've just released Victoria's 'Housing Statement' - The Decade Ahead 2024-2034, which sets a bold target to build 800,000 new homes - 80,000 a year - across the state over the next 10 years, delivered through an Affordability Partnership with the housing industry.

The Housing Statement focuses on five key areas to tackle the root of the problem - housing supply: good decisions, made faster, cheaper housing, closer to where you work, protecting renters' rights,

more social housing and a long-term housing plan. This work will support 16,000 jobs and this landmark package to boost housing supply and affordability in Victoria - represents the biggest shake-up to planning and housing reform in generations. I'll keep you posted.

In other news

- The new lights are now in place at the Burwood Highway and McMahons Road intersection in Ferntree Gully. Complete early 2024.
- The Eastern Freeway upgrades as part of the North East Link project start next year to reduce travel times and create loads more capacity on the Eastern.
- We've made a change so if you need a refill for the pill or antibiotics for a UTI, you can get it from your chemist.

Blind Creek

The next stage of works is about to kick off on this project. This is the biggest stage and includes the naturalisation of Blind Creek, boardwalks around new wetlands, new shared paths, a footbridge, and steppingstones over the creek, and lots of native plantings. Works in this zone will be complete in mid to late 2024.



Stamford Park Homestead restaurant reopening


Council has appointed a new custodian for the Stamford Park Homestead restaurant, international restaurateur Blesson Verghese. Designing the venue to be accessible to all members of the community Verghese's vision is to include family barbecues and cultural activities across the lawn, jazz nights in the conservatory, a live chef's table in the kitchen garden and for people to enjoy a brunch or high tea on the verandah.

The homestead was built in 1882 by the Row family and is one of the last substantial 19th century houses in the region. Council bought the property in 1988 and embarked on a major capital works program of restoration. The restaurant is due to re-open in November and vouchers from the previous Stamford Park Homestead restaurant will be honoured.

Ferntree Gully Cemetery marks its 150th anniversary

The Ferntree Gully Cemetery was established in 1873, after John Buckley, whose grave lies just inside the main gate, spearheaded a community campaign petitioning the government to set aside five acres of land for this important place.

Operating by community trustees until 1982, Council took over responsibility as trustee and takes great pride in providing this service not only for families and their loved ones but also for the wider community. Council is dedicated to preserving the cemetery's historical and cultural importance ensuring it remains a cherished space for generations to come.

Whilst it may be the burial place of pioneers, convicts, Gallipoli soldiers, cold case victims and prominent figures, including renowned artist Sir Arthur Streeton, it is the stories behind the names on the plaques that have most intrigued local historians.

Foodshare Hub to Support Knox Food Relief Providers

Council are thrilled to announce the launch of the Outer East Foodshare (OEF) Food hub which will directly support the growing need for food relief in our community.

Outer East Foodshare are a volunteer organisation which rescues surplus food, gathers products that don't quite meet the "perfect" standard and collects farm produce that might otherwise go to waste.

The trial warehouse facility in Wantirna, located at the previous Templeton Preschool site at Templeton Reserve, will be the hub for storing, sorting, and distributing food to the more than 35 local food relief services that support Knox residents as well as those in surrounding municipalities.

Council established the Knox Emergency Food Relief Taskforce to work out the best way to sustainably support food relief. The goal for this hub

is to provide a central delivery site, with increased storage capacity, including fridges and freezers, increasing capacity to take rescued or donated food. A local hub will reduce travel costs and time for dedicated volunteers who previously had to travel to a warehouse located outside Knox.

Council has licensed the use of this building to Outer East Foodshare for a 12-month pilot. This provides an opportunity to test the model and measure impact. The hub will be the first Knox community facility to be enrolled in the Food and Organics (FOGO) waste

service, so any foods or scraps which cannot be salvaged will still avoid ending up in landfill.

Outer East Foodshare have received an \$18,000 grant from the Knox Community Development Fund 2023/24 to help their set up of this site. For more information on Outer East Foodshare and how to volunteer visit https://www.outereastfoodshare.org

Reserve



Wantirna Reserve is a valued asset for the local community, and to ensure that current and future community needs are met, Council are developing a Masterplan to upgrade the reserve.

Located on Mountain Highway in Wantirna, the reserve is popular with the local community for a range of active and passive activities such as walking, cycling and playing amongst the tranquil backdrop of Koomba Park and Dandenong Creek Corridor. The proposed works aim to retain the existing landscape features while enhancing and upgrading facilities and amenities for current and future community needs.

The reserve is also home to the Wantirna Tennis Club, Knox Hockey Club, 2nd Wantirna Scout Group, Australian Jazz Museum and Knox Athletics (cross country).

Development of the Masterplan began in 2017/18, however, was put on hold while the tennis and hockey improvements were completed.

The proposed enhancements will include new and improved paths, upgraded playground and park space – including a new dog park, new car parks and refurbished pavilion

Community consultation on the Masterplan was conducted during November with the local community and clubs at the reserve invited to provide their feedback on the proposal.

Zimtsterne (Cinnamon Stars)


Ingredients:

4 egg whites 250g caster sugar 5g cinnamon 300g unpeeled almond meal Icing sugar (for rolling)

Method:

Beat egg whites and caster sugar for 20-30 min until foaming. Take about 3 tbsp of mixture to brush the cinnamon stars with. Combine remaining egg white mixture with cinnamon and almond meal and roll out dough onto icing sugar to 5mm thickness. Cut out stars from rolled dough and put onto a greased tray. Glaze stars with retained egg white mixture and put into preheated oven.

Oven temperature: 150 °C; Baking time: about 20 min)





Osteopathy For The Instrumental Athlete
